Welcome to January, the calm after the storm of the holiday season. There is a holiday that doesn't get much air-time: Epiphany. It's the celebration of the visit of the Magi, or in some cultures: Three Kings Day. It's the 12th Night of Christmas. It's celebrated on January 6th every year.

Part of the tradition is an Epiphany cake. In Spanish speaking cultures, a tiny plastic baby is hidden in the cake. In the UK it's called a 12th Night Cake. In the US, in New Orleans, Mardi Gras is celebrated.

This year for Epiphany, consider gifting your child with a new children's bible. There are some amazing newer bibles on the market with an emphasis on wondering questions and a more open and progressive approach to the bible stories. Here are a few of my favorites:

Shine On Bible – Uses the NRSV translation for the 156 stories and the vibrant pictures with diverse peoples represented invite the reader into the story. There are prompts for wondering, exploring more and connecting with the story. Recommended for ages 8 to 10 years.

Celebrate Wonder Bible Storybook - Again, uses wondering questions to draw the reader into the story. Recommended for ages 3 to 7 years.

Children of God Storybook - a beautifully illustrated and multicultural look at 56 stories, by Desmond Tutu. Recommended for ages 4 to 8 years.

And my favorite translation of the full bible text is the International Children's Bible.

#### Support Free and Fair Elections for All

Our Christian faith impacts our life not only in the church building, but in our everyday lives. If you've ever wondered how our Methodist beliefs intersect with our social/political world, we invite you to check out the website of the UMC General Board of Church and Society – <u>www.umcjustice.org</u>.

One of the topics they highlight in our contemporary context is our calling to support free and fair elections for all. If you click on the link provided, you can read the following:

As United Methodists, we "hold governments responsible for the protection of the rights of the people to free and fair elections" believing that "the form and the leaders of all governments should be determined by exercise of the right to vote guaranteed to all adult citizens." (2016 Book of Discipline, ¶164A)

#### **VOTING RIGHTS**

In the United States, generations of advocates fought to expand the right to vote beyond the original electorate of land-owning white men. And despite constitutional guarantees, this right to vote continues to be under attack by ever-shifting tactics that suppress voter turnout and disenfranchise communities of color. In response to the continued systemic racism that undermines the guarantee of the right to vote to all citizens, The United Methodist Church specifically calls for re-instating and strengthening voting rights protections. (2016 Book of Resolutions 3378: Racism and Economic Justice Against People of Color)

At the bottom of the page, you are urged to write your senator to advocate for free and fair elections. It is a good time to find out how your state handles elections, since not all states are equal. As Methodists we believe all people are equal and all citizens should have access to voter registration & voting, and thus we advocate for reform at a national level. Would you consider putting your faith to work and adding your voice to the call for free and fair voting rights?

#### January is also National Soup Month. Here's a recipe to try:

#### Lasagna Soup

SERVES: 8 PREP TIME: 10 min COOK TIME: 30 min

- 1 lb. Italian sausage, ground
- 1/2 lb. Lean ground beef
- 1 Onion, diced
- 6 Cloves garlic, minced, about 1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> tbsp
- 1 (28 oz) can Crushed tomatoes
- 1 (6 oz) can Tomato paste
- 1 (14 oz) can Tomato sauce
- 4 cups Chicken broth
- 1 tsp Fennel seeds
- 2 tsp Italian seasoning
- 2 tsp Salt
- 1/2 tsp Black pepper
- 8 Lasagna noodles, cooked
- 8 oz Mozzarella, shredded
- 1/2 cup Parmesan cheese
- 1. In a large stock pot, heat 1 tablespoon of olive oil over medium high heat. Add the ground beef, sausage and onions and cook until meat is browned, about 8 minutes. Halfway through cooking the meat add the garlic.
- 2. Once the meat is cooked through, pour in the tomato paste, canned tomatoes, tomato sauce, chicken broth, Italian seasoning, salt, pepper and fennel and simmer on low for 20 minutes.
- 3. While the soup is cooking, prepare the lasagna noodles in a separate pot according to package directions and drain
- 4. Add the cooked lasagna noodles to the pot and stir to combine. Top with the Parmesan and mozzarella cheeses, and some fresh parsley
