As you all hopefully know by now, we are moving into a season of transition in the life of our church. On July 1st, I will be appointed as the pastor of the Clinton United Methodist Church,

and a new pastor will begin their tenure of ministry here in Red Bank. While I know a pastoral transition in the life of a congregation is always a challenge, with plenty of goodbyes to be said, information about the operations and community to pass hands from one leader to another, and new trust and relationships to build, it can also be a time of great reflection, setting the stage for future growth. In our January Church Council meeting, I led a devotion on the gift of Liminal Space, the time of change and transition, the time in-between where you have been and where you are heading. and to keep them there long enough so they can learn something essential. It is the ultimate teachable space." As we lean into this season of transition, not only in our church as we prepare for a pastoral change, but in our everyday lives as COVID-19 continues to impact the way we live, I invite you to open yourself up to this ultimate teachable space. Let us wonder together about what

God is trying to show us about ourselves, our church, and the world around us. May we

always remember that while we journey through this season, we are never alone, but surrounded by our loving community of faith. Don't forget to reach out and offer encouragement to others along the way. May God's deep peace be yours,

I think of the many observances in the Christian faith: Baptism, communion, confirmation, funerals; directive to us as adults to have a conversation about these sacraments and


