The 42nd CROP Hunger Walk will be held on Sunday, October 16, also World Food Day, at Red Bank Regional High School at 1:00 pm. On-line fund raising is already underway and all cash and checks can be turned in on CROP Sunday. In addition, rice, beans,

peanut butter, and soup for 20+ local food pantries are collected under a large tent. Bring your donations to RBR High School at 1 pm on Oct. 16.

Unfortunately, hunger is a growing concern both locally and in the world. Wars, drought, and inflation are fanning those flames and here's a real chance to help! Our Church team needs you to contribute. Be a walker, runner, or part of our "Stroller Brigade"-it's a 5-mile route. Be a donor, on -line, by check or sponsor a walker. Collect and deliver rice, beans,

peanut butter, and soup. This year's goals are \$ 142,000 and 16,000 lbs. of food.

Our Church is the half-way spot for the CROP Walk and we are a water stop sponsor, greeting walkers and runners with fresh water and cheers as they go by.

We celebrated our Solar startup in January 2011, and in just four years we had saved nearly 300,000 pounds of carbon dioxide from entering the atmosphere. Now in 2022 we have saved over 1 million pounds of carbon dioxide and we are going strong with our solar system at church. It has been an exciting time to know we are thriving with clean green energy, through snow, heavy rain, hurricane force winds, and now deep drought! We have also worked to raise awareness and shift to "greener" cleaning materials, installed new windows for better energy conservation, reduced waste by using less disposable dinnerware, and shifted to higher efficiency lighting that uses less electricity. New Jersey has banned single use plastic bags and straws, as well as paper bags, and Styrofoam, making us much more aware of the plastic problem.

Now is a great time to think about how each of us can shrink our carbon footprint on the planet. If you are thinking of a new appliance, be sure to check the energy efficiency. How about a new car - what is the gasoline efficiency? How about an electric or a hybrid? And think about food waste as well. Statistics are shocking: Americans throw away 40% of total food consumption! And it is so easy to turn on our faucet for clean water, while the entire globe is seeing very low river and lake levels, and many western states have cut water usage drastically. We all can watch how we run sink and shower water, and sprinkler systems, and be better stewards of the bounty we have and how we can share some of our abundance with humans and other species in our Web of Life.

Our VBS had a week of learning about God's world summer! Thanks for that program, Bonnie and staff. With your help we can think ahead to more steps to take to use less fossil fuel and more green energy in 2022 and beyond. Thanks for your help in our stewardship of the earth.

## Did you know?

The first Methodist church in Red Bank started as the Methodist Episcopal Society, and shortly (in 1845) changed its name to The Methodist Episcopal Church at Red Bank. The first building, which had many additions added to it faced Broad Street, right around where Jack's Music Shop is today. The original building was a 40x50 foot frame building. The cornerstone was laid in October of 1845,

with a dedication in August of 1846. Behind the building were stables and an Reverend alley called Dugan Alley. William White was the pastor in 1882. During a November night, while giving a sermon, a fire broke out in a stable in Dugan Alley and the building was completely destroyed. A month later, Red Bank Methodists bought a plot on the Southwest corner of Broad and Monmouth Street for \$13,000.

The picture shows the location of the church in 1878, the larger all black building in the middle of the image - on the west side of Broad Street. Broad Street runs north - south in the center.



Dugan Alley is right behind the building, and is present day Emanual Court. Interestingly, there was a Presbeterian church on the corner of Broad and Wallace at the time.

For National Dessert Day...



- 1 package of Nestle Toll House Unicorn chips  $\Diamond$
- Half a package of milk chocolate chips  $\Diamond$
- $\Diamond$
- 1 package of regular size marshmallows
- Colored sugars i.e., pink, red, orange, blue, yellow, green, etc.  $\Diamond$
- $\Diamond$ Water
- $\Diamond$ Parchment paper in a 9 x 9 dish
- 1 regular box of Graham crackers  $\Diamond$

#### **INSTRUCTIONS**

- 1. Line the 9 X 9 dish with Parchment paper. Place the chocolate graham cracker crumbs evenly in the bottom of the dish, on the parchment paper. optional: you can use regular graham crackers too.
- Add the Unicorn chips, and the milk chocolate chips, and spread evenly in the dish. 2.
- Place water in a small dish, and place the colored sugars of your choice in small containers. 3.
- Dip the marshmallows in water, one at a time, and then in the colored sugars, and place them in the dish, on top of the 4. chips, in rows. (see photo)
- When the dish is lined with the marshmallows, place it in the oven on 350 degrees for approximately 15 minutes, or 5. until the marshmallows begin to turn golden brown, and melt a little.
- Remove the dish from the oven, and serve immediately with Graham Crackers for dipping. Enjoy!
