Lent starts this month, on February 22nd, with Ash Wednesday. Lent is another season of the church year in which to focus some time with your family around prayer. In fact, the three pillars of Lent are prayer, almsgiving and fasting. Prayer is the most approachable practice for young people.

Here's an easy way to pray for those you care about – make a Lenten Prayer Chain. Before the 22nd, cut some strips out of construction or printer paper. Get together as a family and make a list of 40 people you want to pray for. It's surprisingly easy to come up with 40 names! Then write the names on the 40 strips of paper and put them in a jar or basket.



Each day of Lent pull a strip and pray for that person. Once you've pulled the strip out and prayed, tape it and connect it to the others and to make a paper chain. As Lent goes on, the paper chain gets longer. Then at Easter, use the chain as part of your decorations.

If you're looking for some other ways to introduce the themes of Lent to your young children, check out Traci Smith's book, Faithful Families for Lent, Easter, and Resurrection: Simple Ways to Create Meaning for the Season. She also offers some excellent theological notes guiding parents on addressing the violence of the crucifixion and the meaning of Jesus' death.

Happy 2023 from Green Faith! We hope you have ideas to share so that we can keep greening our planet and help educate our families and neighbors about solar and wind power and invasive species that are pushing native plants and trees out. We invite you to learn more about what is going on and join our green faith efforts. The paragraph below is from Laura Bagwell, chair of the Eatontown Environmental Committee, and head of the task force that works to prune invasive species.

Thanks for caring for our planet Earth!

Monmouth Invasive Species Strike Team (MISST): In its second year, MISST held 15 invasive plant species work parties at the F. Bliss Price Arboretum and Wildlife Sanctuary, totaling 126 volunteer hours. Normally held on the first Saturday morning of the month, we added an evening work party in July, August and September. We work on different areas of the 47 acre park, mainly cutting invasive vines - mostly English Ivy, Asiatic Bittersweet, and Porcelain berry - off trees, as well as pulling garlic mustard and wineberry. We have not used any chemicals as of this time. We hope perhaps our DPW can spot treat some



stumps to see how that works. In addition to our local Eatontown residents, we have been fortunate to have volunteers from Colts Neck, Shrewsbury, Middletown, Fair Haven, Red Bank, Long Branch, Tinton Falls, Ocean Township, Oceanport. This project is a partnership with Eatontown's Shade Tree Commission, Department of Public Works, Beautify Eatontown, and Green Team. GREEN TEAM CHURCH COUNCIL REPORT

JANUARY 22, 2023

We met to go over our Green Faith pledge and how we can share more information with our congregation. Janie led a short discussion of the history of our Green Faith certification in 2009, with application and start with initial events of audits in 2010, and solar power installed and running by January 2011. Our carbon savings are 1,076,000 lb. of CO2 saved since startup. The goal was to involve the entire congregation, and programs of worship, education, youth, healthy food, interfaith programs, and trash!

From 200-2013 a Capitol Campaign was run for green improvements on our property such as roof replacement, insulation and window replacement along with other projects. There was youth involvement in audits of trash and plastic, Green Fairs with displays and programs and Trex project collecting single use plastic to earn a recycled bench for our playground. Our community involvement was with other denominations and interfaith efforts with temple and mosque visits, and environmental vigils and projects.

Ken Glossbrenner will be leading Adult Education on a book titled Climate Church, Climate World, published in 2018, on the serious moral issues of preserving a livable planet. This will be 7-8 on Wednesday evenings. Ken suggested that we need to hear success stories about our planet, and what individuals, small groups, cities, and countries have done to lessen global climate change.

There was a discussion about: gas power blowers on church property, with a suggestion that we buy electric blowers for our grounds keeping, and family activities such as pollinator garden, and adult and youth participation in weeding, and understanding of no pesticide use on our property so that insects and other pollinators can thrive, and an update on recycling efforts in our congregational communities. Janie asked everyone to send in the recycling rules for their hometowns, so we can post in church and online. We will also be using organic coffee from the Equal Exchange ministry, and hopefully the GF budget can pay for this coffee, which benefits small fair trade farmers globally.

It was suggested that we share a Lenten calendar of earth friendly activities, and Pastor Cam will work with Barbara Roguski on this project, to begin on Ash Wednesday. Janie asked all present to contact the Governor's office to request that April be designated NATIVE PLANT MONTH.

In honor of Great American Pie Month and National Cherry Month, here's an easy recipe to help you celebrate (while at the same time respecting that it's also American Heart Month):


OATMEAL CHERRY CRUMBLE PIE

- 1 1/3 cup spelt, white, or sorghum flour (160g) \Diamond
- 1/4 tsp salt \diamond
- \diamond 3 tbsp pure maple syrup, honey, or agave
- \diamond 1/4 cup oil (44g)
- 3 cups pitted, chopped cherries \Diamond
 - (Tip buy frozen because they are already pitted)
- \Diamond pinch stevia OR 1 tbsp sweetener of choice
- 1/2 cup rolled or quick oats (40g) \Diamond
- \diamond 1/2 cup spelt, white, or sorghum flour (60g) \Diamond 1/8 tsp salt
- \Diamond 2 tbsp pure maple syrup, honey, or agave
- scant 1/8 tsp uncut stevia OR 4 tbsp granulated sugar \diamond
- \Diamond 3 tbsp oil (33g)

Instructions

2.

- 1. Preheat the oven to 350F,
 - line the bottom of an 8-inch round pan, springform, or removable-bottom tart pan with parchment, and set aside.
- In a large mixing bowl, combine the first two ingredients, then stir in the 3 tbsp maple syrup and 1/4 cup oil to make a 3. dough. It will seem dry at first, but just keep stirring until it turns into a dough.
- 4. Smooth evenly into the prepared pan. Press down hard, and bake 12 minutes on the center rack.
- Toss the cherries and pinch stevia or tbsp sweetener, then spread evenly over the baked crust. 5.
- In a third bowl, combine all remaining ingredients. Sprinkle the crumble evenly over the cherry layer. 6.
- 7. Bake 50 minutes. Allow to cool 20 minutes before removing the springform or cutting slices.
- *If you don't have an 8-inch pan, the pie also works in a 9-inch pan if you double the entire recipe.
